

Troop 16 Leadership Position Description

SENIOR PATROL LEADER

GENERAL INFORMATION

Type: Selected by the Scoutmaster

Term: 6 months - 1 year **Reports to:** Scoutmaster

Description: Represents the scouts as the top junior leader in the troop runs all meetings and events.

Comments: The Senior Patrol Leader is the focal point of the troop. He needs to attend as close to all troop

functions as possible. One of the major parts of the SPL's job is to assist with the appointment other troop leaders. He must choose leaders who are able, not just his friends or other popular Scouts.

QUALIFICATIONS

Age: none

Rank: 1st Class or higher

Experience: Previous service such as SPL, ASPL, PL, APL, Troop Quartermaster, Troop Scribe, Troop Librarian,

Instructor, Troop Guide, or Chaplin Aide

Attendance: 75% over previous 6 months

PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

Training: You <u>must</u> attend the troop Junior Leader Training even if you have attended in the past.

Attendance: You are expected to attend 85% of all troop meetings, Patrol Leaders' Council meetings, outings, and

service projects. If your attendance is low, you can be removed from office.

Effort: You are expected to give this job your best effort.

GENERAL LEADERSHIP RESPONSIBILITIES

Uniform: Set the example by wearing your uniform correctly. This means that you will wear all of the parts of

the troop uniform, shirttail tucked in, with all required badges in their correct locations.

Behavior: Set the example by living the Scout Oath and Law in your everyday life. Show Scout Spirit in

everything you say and do.

Attendance: Set the example by being an active Scout. Be on-time for meetings and activities. You must call the

Scoutmaster if you are not going to be at a meeting or if you suddenly have to miss an outing. You also need to make sure that the Assistant Senior Patrol Leader is ready to assume your

responsibilities.

SPECIFIC LEADERSHIP RESPONSIBILITIES

Runs all troop meetings, events, activities, and the annual program planning conference.

Runs the Patrol Leader's Council meeting.

Appoints other troop junior leaders with the advice and counsel of the Scoutmaster.

Assigns duties and responsibilities to junior leaders.

Assists the Scoutmaster with Junior Leader Training.
